Happy New Year! Hoonko, a Service of Gratitude Rev. Tadao Koyama

Happy New Year, everyone! I am so happy to ring in the new year with you all. January always proves to be a very busy month. We never seem to start the year

walking. Always running! January is the month that our temples of Nishi Hongwanji commemorate Hoonko. This is the special service that marks the date of Shinran Shonin's birth in the Pure Land.

This year we are able to celebrate this momentous occasion with a special service where many of the temples of the northwest come together at the Seattle Betsuin. We are also delighted to host Rev. Yoshimichi Ouchi of Toronto Buddhist Temple as our special guest speaker for the Sunday service. This will be a special occasion as Rev. Ouchi was trained at the same ritual and chanting school as Rinban Kusunoki and myself. We plan to demonstrate and hold special services for the Sanghas of the northwest that are not often seen in the BCA.

The purpose of these special rituals as well as all of Hoonko is to honor the teachings and school of Buddhism that Shinran gifted all of us over 700 years ago. While I don't believe that Shinran would want all of the fanfare and services, we as students of this school have somewhat of an obligation to express our gratitude and show how much these teachings mean to us. In Kyoto, at our mother temple, Nishi Hongwanji, this service is observed for exactly one week long!

Shinran himself dedicated the Wasan, Ondokusan, to express his heartfelt gratitude to all of the teachers who had such an influence on his understanding of Amida Buddha. The translation of the hymn goes as follows:

Such is the benevolence of Amida's great compassion, That we must strive to return it, even to the breaking of our bodies;

Such is the benevolence of the masters and true teachers, That we must endeavor to repay it, even to our bones becoming dust.

We sing this Wasan in a lot of our services, usually the second version. While the melody sounds lovely and benign, I also see a deep and emotional quality to it. This helps to convey his gratitude and in a sense, mission to share the teachings that he had been taught.

Hoonko is one of the most important, if not the most important service in our tradition of Jodo Shinshu. As we return to our temples, and begin this new year, it is a great opportunity for us to start with a service that shows and expresses our sincere gratitude to our founder.

A vessel made of metal or ceramics for the burning of incense. Ashes are placed in the vessel so that stick incense



can be burned in it. Jodo Shinshu does not stick the incense stick vertically in the ashes but rather lays it horizontally on the ashes. The stick incense is more of a ember on which to sprinkle ground incense called Oko. This burning of ground incense called Oko is called Oshoko or "Burning Incense" one of the basic rituals of Buddhism.

We had a full and successful year for Bon Odori in 2023 – Sunday Bon Odori, Obon, and Japanese Garden Bon Odori. Attendance was great and we had a much larger than expected

crowd at Obon. In 2019 and last year, 2022, we ran out of a lot of our dance props – kachi kachi, tenugui, and uchiwa. So, 2023 became prop year and we had folks helping out.

Susan Endecott, this year and for the last several years has been taking care of our tenuguis. She washes and irons to make sure they are all clean and ready to go. She also buys fabric and makes more tenugui. This year, in addition to all of her tenugui work, she also got more kachi kachi for us. I got some more fabric for Susan but I bet if she had some volunteers to help with tenugui, she would be grateful. Thank you Susan!

Cecilia Eng who wrote and performs the Bon Odori song for us, donated many cute kids kachi kachi (which the kids nicely share with the grownups:-)). Thank you Cecilia!

Dan Snyder took all of our broken kachi kachi home and put on new strings and bells. After Obon, he took another batch for repair. He also is our chief organizer. I bought some more kachi kachi, uchiwa, and Sterlite storage bins. Handed them to Dan and he got them all organized and ready for Obon. Ty Fredette has been handing out all the props by himself at Obon for many years. However, because we now have many more dancers we have enlisted more helpers. If I remember, our crew is Steve Baer, Jana Nytko, Dan, Ty, and Cheri Yoshida. We also use 4 bins per item so the full crew can all be handing out or collecting props at the same time.

Because of all of this, all the dancers quickly had kachi kachi and uchiwa, and most had tenugui which reduced the transition time between dances.

When all the dust settled, Dan and I got together to get everything organized and stored together, with labels, in the storage room by the Onaijin. Dan made nice looking labels and my task is to print them out and replace the handmade labels. Thank you Dan!

It took a village but now when we have 500 + people here for bon odori, we have props for everyone. And if we don't, we will fix that.

I am grateful to all who helped with this project. You made a big difference. So many helped with the bon odori and it takes all of us to pull off this event. So, thank you all!

The article below by OBT board member Shinya Ichikawa is intended to help make the board more accessible to temple members.



Arigatai - Thankful, Once Again Shinya Ichikawa

OBT President Cathy Yarne requested that Board members write an article each month for the OBT newsletter. And as the most senior

member of the Board, she selected me to write the first article. In the February 2022 Newsletter, I wrote an article entitled Arigatai – Thankful. Thus, the above title.

I was born in Seattle December 9, 1941 under a flashlight. It was two days after Pearl Harbor and the entire west coast was blacked out at night for fear that Japanese airplanes would attack. Both my parents come from a long line of Buddhists priests from Japan, going back well over 20 generations. They immigrated to this country in 1928. My father was the second son in his family. His older brother took over the temple in Japan so my father decided to come to America.

My father was first a priest in Fresno, CA. He returned to Japan briefly with my mother and three children when his mother died in Japan. On their return to America in 1936 he was assigned to the Seattle temple. When war was declared with Japan due to the "Day of Infamy" my father, being a Buddhist priest, was arrested by the FBI in early 1942, being declared a dangerous alien to the country. He was sent to various inland camps in Missoula Montana, Livingston Louisiana and Santa Fe New Mexico. My mother, with seven children, I being the youngest, was sent from Seattle to a War Relocation Authority camp in Minidoka, ID. My wife who is a

year younger than I was born at the Minidoka camp. Sometime in 1944 the family moved from Minidoka to the Crystal City Family Reunion Camp in Texas. In February 1945, my father joined us in Crystal City from Santa Fe. The war with Japan was officially over in December 1945 and we returned to Seattle in February 1946.

In Seattle I was raised in a very racially diverse neighborhood and schools, including kindergarten through high school and the University of Washington. Our family lived in a house directly behind the temple. I attended Sunday services, classes, weddings and funerals at the temple. I left Seattle in 1964 but frequently visit family and friends there.

The temple in Portland was first organized in 1903. The current temple building was constructed and dedicated in November 1966. Ours was the first wedding in the newly constructed temple in June 1967. Reverend Kazuo Nakagami officiated. I believe it was his first wedding to officiate and he seemed as nervous as we were. I have served on the board of directors at the Oregon Buddhist Temple for many years, and was president for one tumultuous year. My retirement since 2006, 17 years ago, allows me to spend more time with my favorite activity which is to play tennis 3 or 4 times a week.

We have two sons, Jeff 53 and David 50 years old, both born in Portland. They attended the Oregon Buddhist Temple growing up. Jeff graduated from UW. On his work assignment, he was sent to Japan for a year and met the girl he would marry. They also had an American wedding in Portland at the Oregon Buddhist Temple officiated by Reverend Julie Hanada-Lee. They live in Austin, TX and have two sons.

Our younger son David graduated from University of Puget Sound in Tacoma. He met his wife-to-be there and they were married at the Seattle Buddhist Temple with retired Rinban Don Castro officiating. They have a daughter and son.
