Ti-Sarana Affirmation Reverend Yuki Sugahara

"Deep mind is the deeply entrusting mind. There are two aspects. One is to believe deeply and decidedly that we are an ordinary being of karmic unwholesomeness caught in birthand-death, ever sinking and ever wandering in transmigration from innumerable kalpas in the past, with never a condition that would lead to emancipation. The second is to believe deeply and decidedly that Amida Buddha's Forty-eight Vows grasp sentient beings, and that allowing ourselves to be carried by the power of the Vow without any doubt or apprehension, we will attain birth."

- The Commentary on the Contemplation Sutra, Shan-Tao

Happy New Year everyone! This is the second New Year the Sugaharas are welcoming in Portland and I hope we are able to welcome more years together with the OBT Sangha!

This year, we have the great good fortune of welcoming Gomonshu, Kojun Otani to OBT in September and of having a Kie-shiki/Ti-sarana affirmation. This will be a once-in-alifetime event, so I strongly recommend that everyone come to OBT when he visits us.

The Kie-shiki/Ti-sarana Affirmation is the ceremony to receive a Buddhist Name to reinforce one's Buddhist identity or to create self-awareness as a Buddhist. "Ti" means "Three (in this case: Buddha, Dharma, Sangha)" and "Sarana" is often translated as "refuge" so Ti-sarana is often translated as "Threefold Refuge." However, this translation often bothers me. The word refuge means "the state of being safe or sheltered from pursuit, danger, or difficulty." But, as the first two of the Four Noble Truths teaches us: 1.the State of Suffering is unsatisfactory-ness, and 2. the Cause of Suffering is selfcenteredness. In Buddhism it is understood that selfcenteredness creates suffering or difficulties.

So, "conversion" is a more accurate translation for Sarana to me. According to the English dictionary, conversion means "the process of changing or causing something to change from one form to another." So the Ti-Sarana is to convert from our tendency to rely on our self-centered ideas to reliance on the Buddha, Dharma and Sangha.

I still remember when I first drove to Osaka from Kyoto for the first time. It is about 33 miles and takes about an hour, so it is not a long drive. My band was having a gig at a club in Osaka that day and I didn't have GPS at that time, so I had to drive using a map. Arriving at the club was easy, but we went out for dinner before returning to Kyoto, so I got turned around.

Trying to return home, I drove about half an hour wandering around the city of Osaka. I realized that I had become completely disoriented! Finally, I asked a convenience store worker the way to get to Kyoto and I was able to get home.

I'm sure that everyone has had the experience of getting lost. Can you recall the reason you became lost? Don't blame your wife/husband/parents/siblings/friends. I got lost because I thought I could drive home relying on my own sense of direction and was embarrassed to ask the way. But when I discarded the thought of being embarrassed, I was able to return home.

So, the "conversion" of reliance often changes the results. According to the words of Shan-tao I shared above, we are wandering in this realm of birth-and-death (suffering) because we are relying on our self-centeredness, but when we "convert" our reliance to the power of the Vow, we are able to experience emancipation from the world of suffering.

I believe the person of Nembutsu often experiences this "conversion" of reliance. We cannot convert ourselves totally, but whenever we encounter the wisdom of Buddha through Nembutsu, our way of thinking changes. However after receiving the wisdom of Buddha, it is easy to revert to our regular self and think in self-centered ways, so we need to keep listening. If we keep receiving the wisdom of Buddha, our way of living will be adjusted, just as I was able to return home by asking the convenience store worker the way. I hope you all live with the guidance of the Buddha, Dharma and Sangha this year.

The Buddhist Swastika and Hitler's Cross: Rescuing a Symbol of Peace from the Forces of Hate by Rev. T. K. Nakagaki

The next Readers' Club meeting is scheduled for the Dharma Exchange on January 20, 2019. This is directly after the Sunday Service. We will be discussing <u>The Buddhist</u> <u>Swastika and Hitler's Cross: Rescuing a Symbol of Peace from the Forces of Hate by Rev. T. K. Nakagaki. All readers must secure their own copy of the book.</u>

The swastika has been used for over three thousand years by billions of people in many cultures and religions—including Buddhism, Jainism and Hinduism—as an auspicious symbol of the sun and good fortune. However, beginning with its hijacking and misappropriation by Nazi Germany, it has also been used, and continues to be used, as a symbol of hate in the Western World. Hitler's device is in fact a "hooked cross." Rev. Nakagaki's book explains how and why these symbols got confused, and offers a path to peace, understanding, and reconciliation.


