- V Vinaya, Discipline. It includes scriptural texts that promote ethical behavior and harmonious community interactions.
- E Eitaikyo, Perpetual Service. A memorial service that recognizes the importance of our connections to those who came before us, to appreciate the interconnectedness of all things, and to keep the temple and the Buddha's teachings alive perpetually.

OBT annually conducts

several services on Memorial Day. The tradition of paying respects to older generations, tending the graves, and offering flowers, was inherited from Japan. In 1948, the 900 Japanese residents of Vanport were said to have been visiting cemeteries on Memorial Day, so were away from their homes when it was flooded. Today, the Japanese Ancestral Society, the caretaker of the Japanese Cemetery, organize volunteers to

maintain this privately owned cemetery. I find cemeteries interesting and restful, even if I am not visiting a passed family member.

Sunday May 25, after service - Oregon Buddhist Temple Columbarium. Located behind the Onaijin, this small room is available as a temporary resting area for cremated remains. A service is done for those who are interred here.

Monday May 26, 10:30am - Forest Lawn Cemetery and Mausoleum, Gresham. The service is conducted by the mausoleum, and for a few family members who are interred here.

Monday, Noon - Japanese Cemetery by Rose City Cemetery, Portland. The service is conducted in the "Japanese Cemetery", which is only accessible through Rose City Cemetery, and is located near NE Beech and 50th.

Monday, 1:00pm – Japanese American Community Memorial Day Service, Japanese Cemetery at Rose City Cemetery, Portland. This service is open to the public, and honors Japanese American (Nisei) Veterans of WWII, Korea, and Vietnam conflicts. It includes many of the greater Portland metropolitan area Japanese-American community. Todd Yuzuriha performs Taps, a melancholy bugle call played at memorial services. Here, Rev. Kosho Finch, Henjyoji Shingon Buddhist Temple, giving a spiritual message at a previous Community Memorial Day service.

Afterwards – Lone Fir Pioneer Cemetery, Portland. A small group usually goes to this cemetery to conduct a short service at the Japanese Ancestral Society monument.

Shinshu holidays.

January 16 Hoonko, Shinran Shonin's Memorial: for Nishi Hongwanji, January 9-16. Higashi Hongwanji uses the Chinese calendar and it occurs in November. They also perform Noh plays.

February 15 Nirvana Day. This pertains to all Buddhists in general and represents Impermanance. At OBT we also celebrate pet memorial.

March 21 Spring Ohigan. Ohigan means "other shore" of Enlightenment, as opposed to "this shore of Delusion.

April. Hanamatsuri, April 8, celebrates the birth of the Shakamumi Buddha.

September. Fall Ohigan. Leaves change color.

October to November – Eitaikyo. "Thanks to the many who have gone before us for this temple".

December. Bodhi Day, which is celebrated on the 8th but the historical basis for this date is unknown,

December 31. New Years Eve year-end service.

Book Talk: The Poet and the Silk Girl: A Memoir of Love, Imprisonment, and Protest



The OBT and JAMO (Japanese American Museum of Oregon) are cosponsoring a book talk and opportunity to meet Dr. Satsuki Ina, author, activist, psychotherapist specializing as a community trauma consultant, and Buddhist.

Dr. Ina will talk about her latest book, *The Poet and the Silk Girl: a Memoir of Love, Imprisonment, and Protest,* and will be available to respond to questions from participants.

Julie Abo, educator, historian, and outreach consultant will be our moderator.

Copies of the book are on sale at the OBT and JAMO (\$35).

One of the most compelling accounts of the forced removal, unjust incarceration, and family separation experienced by the Japanese American community during WWII. Born in an American concentration camp, Satsuki Ina weaves her own experiences into conversation with her parents' wartime letters and father's haiku poetry from behind barbed wire to show how family history is a part of the very fabric of the struggle to belong in America. Brilliantly reveals how the past, present, and future are interlinked.


