What will the Future Bring? Reverend Yuki Sugahara

(This is my Eitaikyo/Perpetual Memorial Service Dharma Talk)

People of the modern age should look into the past; the people of the past

transmit the ancient. The stories would be lost, but the written will not be lost.

(Yuki's translation of *Rennyo Shonin Goichidaiki Kikigaki*/A Record of Saying of Rennyo Shonin)

Welcome to this year's Eitaikyo Perpetual Memorial Service. This is the service to appreciate our predecessors for transmitting the teaching to us. Oregon Buddhist Temple was established in 1903 and has been here in Portland, Oregon for nearly 120 years. We were able to be here for this long time because many people enjoyed the teaching of nembutsu, enjoyed friendship through the teaching and they supported the temple.

Thinking about the history of the US declaring independence in 1776, it has been 245 years since then. Oregon Buddhist Temple has been here for the half of the US history. That is amazing thing. But, this always reminds me how young the US is. Do you know that my home temple in Japan has a history of over 350 years? We celebrated the 350th year establishment of the temple in 1988 and buried a time capsule at that time. Some OBT members visited my home temple in 2018 and saw what was inside the time capsule. I believe I have talked about this at one of my Dharma talks in November or December 2018. You can find it in the videos on YouTube on the newsletter, but my home temple now has over 380 years of history. It is unfortunate that my home temple will not be able to survive for future generations because of the area's depopulation But the teaching of nembutsu which my ancestors enjoyed and tried to convey to others is in me. So I hope many people are touched by the teaching of nembutsu through my Dharma talks and live with the teachings. I think this is what I can do to repay my debt of gratitude I owe to my ancestors.

Oregon Buddhist Temple was established in 1903. The first minister was Rev. Shozui Wakabayashi, and we had 23

ministers before me. I think I shared the list I have attached to the end of my message two years ago, but when we are back to in-person services, you can come to OBT to see the pictures of them, including my picture on the wall outside of the Hondo. I cannot speak for all of the ministers, but I am sure they wanted to spread the Jodo Shinshu teaching in the US, and in Portland, Oregon.

As far as I know, we have graves for the two ministers in Portland because they passed away while they were serving here or they were one of the important ministers for OBT. Both are in the Japanese section of Rose City Cemetery.

One is Rev. Wakabayashi, the founding minister of Oregon Buddhist Temple. There is a title called "Ingo" that is presented to those who devoted themselves to spread the teaching. His Ingo is Gaku-Cho-In. Gaku 楽 means enjoy, Cho 聴 means listen, so his Ingo means Enjoy Listening.

From his Ingo, I can imagine what kind of person Rev. Wakabayashi was. He was a young man in his twenties when he came to the US. I am sure he was very energetic and passionate to share the teachings. The founding members of OBT must have enjoyed seeing him and listening to his talks. I cannot compare myself to Rev. Wakabayashi's efforts, but I hope today's members of OBT are feeling the same way about me.

The second minister who has a grave in the Japanese section of Rose City Cemetery is Rev. Tansai Terakawa who passed away at the Minidoka Internment Camp. I cannot imagine the regret Rev. Terakawa felt when he had to close the temple down to move to Minidoka. I am sure that he tried to cheer up people and might have said many times, "we are always in the working of Amida Buddha, grasped and never to be abandoned..." It is really unfortunate that he was not able to come back to OBT.

Rev. Terakawa's Ingo is Gan-Kai-In. Gan 願 means vow or wish, Kai 海 means ocean. Usually in Jodo Shinshu "Gankai," the ocean of the vow, refers to how vast and deep the compassionate vow of Amida is. Rev. Terakawa shared the teaching of nembutsu, teaching of the great compassion of Amida Buddha. Imagining his compassionate figure of cheering people up in the difficult time, I feel like he was a man of compassion.

Rev. Terakawa's name Tan-sai is a very nice name. Tan 湛 has various meanings, but one of the meanings us "to save". So his name is expressing the complete, perfect working to save multitude of beings. This refers to the working of Amida Buddha's compassionate vow. So his Ingo title and his name match very well.

Of course, not only these two ministers, but all the other ministers made great effort to spread the Dharma and many of the members enjoyed the teaching of nembutsu and supported the temple and the life of the ministers. That is why Oregon Buddhist Temple is still here and I am being able to live here.

The words I shared at the beginning of my talk are the words of Rennyo Shonin. He said "People of the modern age should look into the past; the people of the past transmit the ancient. The stories would be lost, but the written will not be lost." We often think that history is something we learn in the classroom and is not of much important in our lives, but history is actually is living as our lives. Because of the history, we are able to be here. If one page of the history book was missing, we would not here today.

There is always something we can learn from the past, for example the current pandemic. If we were able to know how to deal with viruses through past experiences, it will be helpful in the future. So, past is not just history, but there is something we can learn from the past. Past history should not be lost. I often think that I should have asked my grandparents about their experiences during World War II. The stories I heard are so few. My mother's side grandpa left a storybook of his experience of internment in Siberia so I can learn how terrible it was. I learned how terrible war is and how we should not repeat it. So spoken stories might be lost or forgotten, but written stories are less likely to be lost.

It is same for the teachings. Because Shinran Shonin left many written teachings regarding nembutsu that he learned from his teacher Honen Shonin, we are able to listen and learn the teaching. So on this occasion of Eitaikyo/Perpetual Memorial Service, We once again look back and learn from the past, and hand the nembutsu down to the next generations.
