On February 3, the Oregon Buddhist Temple had our annual general meeting. In preparing for my presentation, I performed the exercise of trying to describe the state of the temple, as I see it, in a single word. Those of you who attended the meeting know that the word I chose was "Evolving". In my opinion, this is a good state in which to be. Evolving implies life and growth and changing to address issues of the present all in an effort to secure a future. Any organization that cannot change is soon obsolete and destined for the scrapheap.

While we all know that change happens, it is nonetheless hard. Even for an organization such as OBT, who holds the truth of impermanence as a central tenet, change is difficult. One of the responsibilities of the board is to lead the Sangha and to make the call when we see change is needed. Fortunately we have a dedicated team of board members who have OBT's welfare at heart. Whether it is trying to address the dwindling toban participation, flat revenue generation and excessively labor intensive menu items of our food fund raising events, our limited pool of traditional revenue sources, or any of the other issues we face, I know every board member is determined to do the best he or she can for OBT.

As I said, change is hard and we don't take it lightly. Please be patient. We may not get everything exactly right the first time, but we are confident that over time the changes will evolve and prove to be the right course for OBT. By-the-way, thoughts of change is not the sole purview of the board. We welcome your ideas and especially your participation in the solution. If you have an idea you'd like to bring to the board and discuss, please see me and I will gladly add you to a board meeting agenda. This year we meet on the 2nd Friday of every month (except August) and all temple members are welcome to attend.

On to other topics; as of this writing, we are gearing up for the Spring Food Bazaar. Thank you Chiki Kwong, Marilyn Achterman and Ann Shintani for stepping up to co-chair this

important fund raising event. Knowing their effort, I am confident it will be a great event. We are still looking for event chairs for our other 2 major fund raisers, Obon (August 3) and Sukiyaki (October 6). I did hear one of the Spring Bazaar co-chairs mention she was having a good time planning and leading the event. You can join in the fun. If you haven't tried being a chair before, you may want to talk with Chiki, Marilyn and/or Ann to get an idea of what they do.

Finally, OBT is the host temple for the 2014 NW Buddhist Convention. The event is scheduled for February 7–9, 2014 at the Portland Airport Sheraton. We will have a planning meeting as a Dharma Exchange on Sunday March 10. I hope to see you there.

Changes to toban

In addition to my duties on the OBT Board, I, as many of you know, am also Toban Coordinator. The recent changes to the Toban system that started in February have led many temple members to communicate to me strong feelings about the system. I want to explain what precipitated the changes. For months I had heard from various, and not just a few, members that the packed Toban schedules had become a burden to the members of the teams. I was finding coordinating the teams was becoming more and more difficult. After months of on-and-off discussion at meetings the OBT Board decided to implement the changes. The feedback, both in support and in dissent, has been strong. One of the great strengths of Oregon Buddhist Temple is its sense of community. What I have learned over the past few weeks is that community happens for different members of the Sangha in different ways. Whereas many people find bringing snacks after Dharma Exchange (in addition to the other duties of toban) a great hassle and burden, a great many others find that it makes them feel more connected to the temple. I presented the feedback I had received to the Board at the February meeting and it was decided to keep the changes as they are; namely the separation of Toban and Dharma Exchange refreshments. This being said, there is nothing stopping those who are on Toban from signing up from bringing Dharma Exchange refreshments during their month but it will remain off the official Toban calendar.

I do need to again emphasize that the Dharma Exchange refreshments is not just about bringing food: it’s about staying after to do cleanup. In fact, the cleanup is of greater concern than the food provided; basic hygiene (and the Health Department) requires us to clean our plates and cups properly


(meaning using the dishwasher) and wipe down surfaces with bleach water after we eat.

I have an appreciation for the concern that this new system is confusing and not yet completely ironed-out. It is still a work in progress. It would be wonderful if someone wanted to step forward to help make the Dharma Exchange refreshments a smoother system. It would be a great relief to me if someone who is already at Dharma Exchange regularly wanted to partner with me to make this a success. If you are interested or know someone who may be, please contact me.

At the NW Buddhist Convention last weekend Bishop Umezu was discussing change. He used a metaphor of a glass with water in it. The water is the Dharma and the glass is the structure that holds the Dharma, in his case he was referring to BCA. The glass can change shape and look different but the Dharma does not change. In the same way the glass of Toban can change but the water, our community, our connectedness, does not need to change


NW Buddhist Convention ***Etsu Osaki***
