Happy New Year everyone! I cannot believe that it has been 10 months already since we had to cancel the in-person services, but I hope everyone is staying safe and well.

Around last March, most of us were unfamiliar with the internet platforms such as Zoom, Google Meets and so on, but now they are necessarily tools for us to communicate, learn, and enjoy the social times. I feel that our lives have completely changed from last year and the year 2021 which is going to be the beginning of the new year of a new era.

This situation forced us to realize the truth of impermanence. Everything changes and this is the law of nature, yet, it is difficult for us to abandon the wish to live just like it used be, with no need of worrying about the virus. The approval of the vaccine is good news and I hope it is going to work well.

Buddhism in general teaches us to discard desires and attachments to this world but how about Jodo Shinshu teachings? Our founder Shinran Shonin and Yuien, one of Shinran's disciples, had conversations regarding birth into the Pure Land in Chapter 9 of Tannisho. Shinran Shonin said:

It is hard for us to abandon this old home of pain, where we have been transmigrating from innumerable kalpas down to the present, and we feel no longing for the Pure Land of peace, where we have yet to be born. Truly, how powerful our blind passions are! But though we feel reluctant to part from this world, at the moment our karmic bonds to this Sahā world run out and helplessly we die, we shall go to that land. (CWS, p. 666)

Jodo Shinshu teachings never ask us to abandon desire and attachments to this world. Instead, because of our attachments to this world, we are grasped in the working of Amida Buddha's Universal Primal Vow. Through this working of Amida Buddha, we receive the directing of virtues to going forth into the Pure Land and returning to this world.

Simply, through the working of Amida Buddha, we attain birth into the realm of nirvana called Sukhāvatī, the Buddha land, the Pure Land of Amida Buddha and attain Buddhahood when we pass away. Because, our birth will be settled when we receive the working of Amida Buddha without doubt (shinjin), we attain the stage of truly settled in this life. Also, Buddhas work to save all beings from sufferings. So, after the attainment of Buddhahood, we become the working to lead others, our families and friends in this sahā world (sahā: the realm where we bear/endure sufferings) to the Pure Land path.

This situation with COVID-19 makes us worry about contracting the virus and passing away. This is because of our attachments to this world. But, the Pure Land teaching teaches us that there is no need to worry about what is going to happen when we die. Before we encountered the teaching, our lives were just the lives of living and dying, but after we encountered the teaching and received shinjin/entrusting heart, our lives became the life of definitely going to be born into the Pure Land.

Just like babies in the womb of mothers receiving nutrition to prepare to be born into a new era of this world, when we receive and accept the Pure Land teachings in our daily lives, we feel that our lives have entered a "new era."

We are still not sure when we can resume the in-person services, but I am looking forward to share, listen and enjoy the teaching of the Pure Land with you in 2021.

I hope to see you soon and until then, please take care. Gassho.

The year end is a time of self reflection. On a personal level this includes the end of my term as OBT President.

I have to list the corona virus and the water/sewer damage in the basement as the year's "all-time lows" but I'd rather focus on my top two "highs" for the year.

The first is "In the Spirit of Giving" - Benefit Concert. This was our first attempt at a fundraiser like this. It was a big success with the final total exceeding \$100,000.

The second "high" of this past year was our temple's efforts to reach people "on-line." Since we were already making the weekly Dharma talks available on-line, the transition to putting the entire service on-line was somewhat natural. Sensei started offering a brief daily service. Then we added dharma exchange, dharma school and study classes continued on zoom. The monthly newsletter is emailed to everyone. Although there are many, many people who have contributed to make all this possible, Rev. Sugahara has played a significant role.

For those unfamiliar with the Japanese word "orei" - this is typically a gift of appreciation to individuals or organizations for their support and guidance. In a recent dharma talk, Rev. Sugahara spoke about orei being synonymous with thanksgiving. When someone gives orei to the temple it is an expression of gratitude for the Buddha Dharma. This tradition also includes orei to individuals. As an expression of our gratitude OBT is giving an orei to Rev. Yuki. We'd like to acknowledge his leadership and participation in temple activities, his knowledge of Jodo Shinshu and dedication to sharing and helping us experience and learn about the Dharma.

Even though we are not a temple in Japan, the concept of thanksgiving - whether it's a card, letter, present or monetary orei, a personal expression of gratitude is universal and a timeless act. As you reflect upon 2020 I hope you consider who has made a positive impact on you and make an effort to acknowledge and express your gratitude to them.

As outgoing president, my final statement to the Sangha is simply say, "thank you." I'm very grateful for all that you do to support the Oregon Buddhist Temple.

Hoonko (Memorial Honoring Shinran Shonin) – January 16

As the most important Jodo Shinshu observance, this is the date chosen to commemorate Shinran Shonin's passing. Traditionally, seven days of services are conducted at *Honzan*, culminating on January 16. During that period, numerous activities are held, recalling the legacy that the Founder has left. This gives practicers a chance to "hear the light" through listening to sermons, talks, ritual and Sangha fellowship. Generally, temples conduct their own Hoonko observances in the fall so that members can attend the services at Honzan. From the book, Jodo Shinshu a Guide

She will draw on her experience as a psychologist and Buddhist minister in her presentation "Compassionate Listening: Therapeutically Engaging with Others and the Buddha-Dharma."

During this seminar, she will lead us in:

1) Looking at the differences of sympathy and empathy and how it can lead to compassionate action

2) Defining "attending skills," which are important to active listening and how it facilitates compassionate support to others3) Exploring the therapeutic benefits of receiving and listening to the Buddha-Dharma

Join us via Zoom for what promises to be an interesting seminar.

Rev. Candice Shibata was born in San Jose, California and moved to Stockton, California shortly after her birth. While growing up, she attended Dharma School at the Buddhist Church of Stockton.

Rev. Candice has a BA in Psychology from California State University, Sacramento. After graduation, she was a case manager for children with special needs. In 2009, she obtained her first Master of Arts degree in counseling psychology from the University of San Francisco. Following graduate school, she interned as a therapist at two elementary schools from 2009-2010.

In September 2012, she received Tokudo ordination in Kyoto and served as the minister's assistant at the Buddhist Church of Stockton. She graduated with her second master's degree in Buddhist studies from the Institute of Buddhist Studies and Graduate Theological Union in May 2015. One month later, she returned to Japan to complete her Kyoshi certification. Rev. Candice became the resident minister of the Berkeley Buddhist Temple on January 1, 2016 and worked there for two years until her relocation to the Buddhist Church of Florin on January 1st of 2018. She began her new assignment at the Buddhist Church of Stockton on July 1, 2020. Rev. Candice is the 4th generation Shibata to serve in the Buddhist Churches of America.

How I miss the food preparation days at the otera! The rhythmic sounds of carrots being chopped, sizzling noodles in the wok, the timer ding of the microwave, tossing the chow mein for cooling, slicing kamaboko in 30 slices, cutting 5 star oranges for garnish and so forth. More than anything, though, I miss the great lunches served to the helpers. Atsuko's lemon dessert, Nancy's matsutake rice, Robbi's secret curry, Katie's potato salad come to mind. One dish I loved was "Surimi Fritters" served by Kiyomi. If mac and cheese have become boring, you might like to try the following. It is modified to serve 3-4 people and so easy to make.

SURIMI (imitation crab) FRITTERS

- 2 C. surimi (separate to smaller pieces))
- ¹/₄ medium onion, finely diced
- 1/3 C. carrot finely diced
- 5 string beans in ¹/₄ inch pieces (other veggies okay)
- 3 eggs
- ¹/₂ tsp. white pepper
- ¹/₂ pkg dashi no moto
- 1 tsp. kosher salt
- $\frac{1}{2}$ C. flour

Mix everything together. If too soft add more flour. Heat 1" of oil in skillet. When hot (a drop of batter sizzles), mound crab mixture on tablespoon and fry. Turn over 2 or 3 times to brown evenly. Put on absorbent paper. plate. Serve with lemon slices and dipping sauce of choice

For this year, Sensei's Bodhi Day theme is "change" for our Student Messages, an aspect of this service that we

did not want to have cancelled. Davis, Julianne, Midori and Mika (middle school, Dana class) shared what they have been doing in their spare time, in a short video, including connecting with each other through an on-line game platform, and making designs (like a replica of the temple below).

Mayu shared about creating her playful videos of Amabie, a traditional Japanese Yokai (a supernatural creature) who promises to cure a pandemic if the townspeople produce and show images of it. Broadcasting these videos introduced her to a way of engaging with other artists and fans from around the world
