Upcoming Events

Rev. Jundo Gregory Gibbs

I hope that this newsletter reaches you just before our Obonfest. If our Obon festival has already passed as you read this, let me thank you in advance for your support of this most important religious, cultural and fund-raising event. If you are reading

this after Obonfest, I hope you are getting rested and your energies are on the way to being restored.

Although it is still several months off, I want to begin to inform you all about our 110th Anniversary celebration. This coming November 16 and 17, we will commemorate the Oregon Buddhist Temple's 110th Anniversary. On Saturday, November 16, we will start at 1 p.m., with a discussion in Japanese led by Rev. Harry Bridge and Rev. Dr. Mark Unno. Our two presenters are quite bi-lingual, so, if your Japanese skills are no better than mine, you could still participate. I will ask Rev. Unno and Rev. Bridge to speak in Japanese and then briefly summarize what they just said in English. You can also ask questions in English in this first session. After a break we'll resume at 2:30 p.m., with an English-language presentation including our two panelists and myself. We'll allow 90 minutes for that session and the whole afternoon of Buddhist discussion will be done by 4 p.m. What exactly will be the topic of the presentations? We aren't sure yet. We are letting the general theme: "Honor the past, live the present, build the future" mulch in our unconscious minds. We will come up with something focused and coherent in our address of the Buddha-dharma. Forgive me for giving such a preliminary overview at this time.

On Sunday, November 17, we will combine our 110th Memorial service with our yearly Eitaikyo service. As usual, we will start with a Dharma-message in Japanese. Rev. Mark Unno will deliver that Japanese-language talk and also the English-language Dharma-message at the main service, which will start at 10 a.m. We expect to have a bento lunch following the service. This will be by pre-order and we will inform you ahead of time of the cost

(probably \$20) and the deadline. Please keep checking this newsletter each month as the event draws closer, and we will give you more details on the event.

On August 24, OBT's Dharma school Teachers will host the yearly NW District Dharma-School Teachers Conference. The last time we were the hosts, it was an excellent event. I expect a repeat of the wonderful job our Dharma-School teachers and teachers emeritus did a few years back. I am often embarrassed by how much effort is put in by our lay leaders at OBT. If we had to pay all of you a dollar an hour for all you do for our temple, our account would soon be bankrupt.

I encourage you to attend our 110th anniversary in three months. I thank you for your support of our Obonfest this month. You all worked so hard on it. Still let me make a special point of thanking the chairperson, Dr. Yoshi Ono. A lot of work goes into these events but we don't want to work you all or even myself so very hard. In the end it is all a matter of being part of a community that endeavors to live with appreciation, enjoyment, decency and gratitude. Thank you again.

President's Message

In my article last month I mentioned the decline in OBT's membership rolls. While we do face challenges in attracting new members, we are taking steps to increase our public exposure. This past month, we, for the 3rd consecutive year,

ran a photo booth at the Natsu Matsuri organized by the Yuuyake Shimbun. People who visited our booth and had their picture taken while wearing a yukata had a great time. Ostensibly a fund-raiser, we viewed this more as an opportunity to advertise Obon and to let people know that we existed. I talked with many people who did not know of us, some of whom had Jodo Shinshu family, and who expressed interest in our teachings and activities. While it may not have been a particularly lucrative fund-raiser, it met our goal of exposure.

This is not our only public outreach event. We will be participating for the second time, in the Pacific Rim Festival at SakeOne at the end of this month. We will be running a photo booth there as well. Again the goal is one of exposure rather than fund raising.

We also need to expand our fund raisers, to extend beyond our traditional sources. Our fund raisers are primarily food-based events with a fairly small base. These fund raisers have been successful but they are what they are and as they now stand there is little opportunity for growth. We have seen that they are insufficient to meet our operating needs. We need to expand our thinking about fund raising opportunities. This year we had a booth at the Beaverton International Celebration (event has not happened as of this writing) selling tofu bowls and ika on a stick. This is still a food based fund raiser but it is "fishing new waters" and not relying primarily on people who have supported us in the past. It is also a chance to introduce ourselves to new people.

We have other ideas we will be trying, i.e. a craft fair in November. We are looking for other opportunities where we can accomplish both goals of introducing ourselves to people who may be interested in our teachings and expand our fund raising efforts beyond our traditional activities and customers.

I realize that these plans may be outside of what we have done in the past and may be pushing the boundaries of our collective comfort zone, I believe it is the direction that we must go. I would like to hear your ideas on these and other topics on the direction we should go.
