Natsukashii! A Familiar Feeling Rev. Tadao Koyama

Hello everyone! Happy April and spring has sprung! As I am writing this newsletter to you all, I am in Japan attending a special

Kaikyoshi program being headed by our head temple, Nishi Hongwanji.

Having already participated in one morning service, with my knees aching, I am swept with an overwhelming sense of natsukashii! This is a word that reflects this familiar feeling we get from a place, or a setting that brings up a great wealth of emotion, usually from a deep and profound experience. This experience of participating in the morning service at Hongwanji brought up all of these emotions for me! I felt in a sense that I was returning to drink water from the well of Hongwanji.

In America, and in the west, sometimes we have this feeling towards establishments or institutions. It could stem from the protestant background our country has, but we tend to mistrust establishments and institutions for many reasons. Of course, there is some validity to these feelings as religious institutions have been responsible for abuse, oppression, and prejudicial doctrines.

While I don't believe that Hongwanji is a perfect entity, I can never forget what this institution has done for me and all of the privileges I have been gifted by the head temple. One of them being granted the responsibility to continue to teach the ritual and chanting traditions to future priests of the BCA.

Coming back to Nishi Hongwanji and hearing all of the chanting being done in the traditional manner once again made me realize just how lucky I am to have been able to go and learn at Gonshikishidousho (the ritual chanting school of Nishi Hongwanji). If I had waited even one year, I would not have been able to learn first-hand as the pandemic just happened. I would like to thank all of the temple members, the BCA and my family for supporting me during my journey of learning at Nishi Hongwanji. For without their blessing, I would not have been able to go! Okagesamade!

sense of belonging. A community is a good place to find and build meaningful relationships, thus creating a sense of belonging, confirmation, and togetherness.

- Education & Inspiration: A community can be a source of information, inspiration, and motivation. It may include people who have different views, experiences, or beliefs, and learning from them can be helpful and motivating when forming opinions and making decisions.
- **Opportunities:** A community can be a place to find or build opportunities to share and make your situation better as well as opportunities to influence and/or help others. A community can give us the confidence and motivation to invest in our well-being and the well-being of others.

The Oregon Buddhist Temple is a community. Regardless of ethnicity, age, gender/sexuality, socio-economic status, physical ability, history, or political affiliation, membership is open to all. Just looking at our Sangha, on any given Sunday, you can see a community that exemplifies and values each of the bullet points included above.

Copies of the book are on sale at the OBT and JAMO (\$35).




