Nirvana. What does it Mean? Rev. Tadao Koyama

Happy February everyone! I hope you were all able to ride out the storms of winter in warmth and comfort with your family.

Our January was quite busy! I always feel like we hit the ground running because we have so much to do in so little time. First we have the two New Year's Eve and New Year's Day services. It definitely feels like more and more folks are attending these services to ring in the New Year! What a wonderful feeling! The other event that is so important for us as Jodo Shinshu Buddhists is our annual Hoonko service. This is the service that commemorates our founder's birth in the pure land.

This year we were originally planning on hosting this service with the ministers of Seattle, White River, and Tacoma at the Seattle Betsuin Buddhist Temple. However, due to the tragic event of the fire that occurred at Seattle we were unable to have the service we originally intended. Yet, in times of great hardship, I have also seen acts of great kindness and compassion. The fire at Seattle Betsuin also spurred an immediate reaction from the other temples and sanghas in the northwest to reach out and offer help. (see page 9 to help)

We all felt that this service was so important that with the quick working of Rinban Kusunoki, Rev. Cyndi Yasaki, and the generous community of the White River Buddhist Temple, we were able to hold the service at their temple and still offer a wonderful tribute to our venerable master Shinran.

February is usually the month we celebrate Nirvana Day. This marks the day that the Buddha passed into parinirvana and achieved the highest level of enlightenment we could possibly know. This also marks the time that the Buddha died in his physical body. Yet his teachings continue to live on to this day.

We see this term "Nirvana" a lot. A popular band was formed in the 80s from the state of Washington actually! However, does this term actually mean? I have heard this term used in a multitude of fashions. Some have used it to refer to the "Buddhist Heaven", which I definitely don't agree with. It's also been used to describe this euphoric state of mind that is equal to enlightenment. I am not sure I fully agree with this term either.

If we look at the direct translation of Nirvana, it literally means, "to blow out", which is often associated with the blowing out the flame of a candle. It implies the snuffing out of all of our blind passions and imperfections that hinder us from enlightenment. So in a sense, for us as Jodo Shinshu Buddhists, it is something that occurs after we die. Yet at the same time, we do not wait around and lament our existence and wait for death.

In our tradition's teachings, Amida Buddha achieved the perfect state of Nirvana ten kalpas ago, and is still working in the pure land to send us wisdom and compassion in our life right now. So while we ourselves as bonbu or unenlightened beings cannot hope to achieve true Nirvana by our own means and in this lifetime, we do not need to despair as the enlightened wisdom and compassion continues to come to us at this very moment, purely for our benefit.

Nirvana Day, February 18 (Nehan-E 涅槃会) "Nirvana-gathering"

The Sanskrit word Nirvana comes from the root "va" which means "to blow", adding the stem "ana" which means to make, and the prefix "nir" which means "off" or "out". Hence, Nirvana means "the blowing out or extinction". It is understood to mean the blowing out or extinction of the flame of personal desire.

When Shakamuni Buddha attained Enlightenment under the Bodhi Tree, he had achieved Nirvana. However, since he still was in his earthly form, he had not achieved complete Nirvana. When he died at the age of 80, he entered into complete Nirvana.

Shinran Shonin Study Turning One's Mind Wisdom

Hoonko is Shinran Shonin's Memorial Service, where we express gratitude for his teachings, usually in the month of January. We think about his teachings to "turn one's mind" to seeing ourselves as we truly are, and about Shinjin, the awakening heart of Amida Buddha. The Five Gates of Awareness are a way to do this: (1) ritual acts (such as chanting), (2) reciting the Nembutsu or Namu Amida Butsu, (3) study, (4) seeking wisdom, and (5) "directing virtue" (or "heart").



Healthy Body + Karate By Avery Hughes-Davis

Continuing in February, I will periodically be teaching free wellness lessons after service to interested Dharma School students. This class will be called

Healthy Body + Karate and will be a combination of basic karate moves and overall practices in wellness. I will focus on very basic karate stances and forms and also on mental discipline, self-care, stretching, and positive thinking. These classes will be available to students in the following age ranges: 11 and under and then 12-17. The younger class will go first, directly following Sunday service, and then the second group will be invited to attend right after the younger group finishes.

A little bit about my experience! Having studied karate

for over 10 years, culminating in reaching Black Belt status through Krav Maga at East West Martial Arts in Vancouver, I have had time to receive many teachings from a variety of skilled instructors. I attended karate three times a week, participated demonstrations, in attaining the belt levels along the way to Black Belt, and loved what I learned there. This should be a fun experience for all involved and I will strive to help students gain a better understanding of karate while also promoting a healthy body philosophy.



Parent/guardian visitors are encouraged to watch class (but not required) and each participating student and their parent/guardian will be asked to sign a waiver in order to participate. Class will not be strenuous or dangerous in any way, but a waiver will be in place to protect all involved.

We hope you'll join us for this fun and new experience at OBT. Students should be dressed in casual, athletic wear. 

thing helps us transmit Japanese art and culture, nurture friendships, welcome newcomers and produce Portland products commanding a very pretty penny—all with no waste, ongoing reuse and ever-increasing gratitude.

It's not a computer, though it is up-to-the-minute. It's not a dreary AI chatbot, though it's right there with you if self-expression is your thing. Its products draw people to Obon in droves, wanting a piece of OBT's artistry and care; bringing in many thousands of dollars each year so that we, in turn, might care for the temple.

Does it sound like something a sorcerer might use? Don't worry, it comes with a trio of Sensei. Yasuko Fields, Toyoko Oguri and Debi Shimamoto, master craftswomen all, serve as facilitators for the Mottainai Craft Group. Mottainai: nothing frittered away; everything connected, transformed, reused; every pair of hands welcomed. If you come to the group, you can even work on your own projects—as well as have a hand in producing the stunning kimono, yukata, happi coats, bags, scarves and other works of art that community members stampede to buy at our temple's events.

The remarkable device is a sewing machine, and *the ability to make and repair clothing* is of paramount importance, a basic human skill deserving particular attention as we think about better functioning within our ecosystems. Plus, it's just fun! The craft group meets monthly and has had a significant influx of young adults from beyond the temple's gates. Please come visit. You can bring your own machine or work with the group's. They are also looking for an additional, donated machine; so if you've got an old one that's portable and can sit on a table top, weighs less than 30 pounds, and is in good working order with a foot control, power cord and all original accessories—the group would happily give it a new home! (Bonus points for the original instruction manual.)
