I hope that you are each in good health and amidst positive circumstances as you

read this. Please allow me to thank you for your support of our Sukiyaki Bazaar. This event may have already been completed as you read this. I am still looking forward to the Sukiyaki Bazaar as I write this article. I very much appreciate Ann Shintani-Winner's chairing this event. With her leadership and the support of all of you I am confident that the food will be good, the companionship nurturing and the donations to the temple substantial.

One event this month I especially wanted to draw your attention to is the panel discussion on "The Role of Ritual in Religious traditions". This will be on the second Saturday of the month, October 10th at 2 p.m. In our temple's hondo (or "main chapel"). I have asked the Minister's Assistants to do the actual presentation-side of the body of the seminar. I will sit in with them to address questions as some might pertain to the specifically Jodo Shinshu view of ritual behavior. Like all of our seminars this is open to the public without charge.

October is harvest season but many of you, like me, do not live on farms even though our parents were born on them. The natural rhythm of life that my parents learned in farming and ranching are less obvious to those of us who have been life-long city dwellers. One thing we miss that our predecessors had in their lives is the naturalness of slowing down and taking in the fact that it has been a good year. Once the harvest was in, in good years, my dad's family could relax and say, "despite all the hard work, the harvest is in and we are secure."

As city dwellers there is always something more to do and no natural point at which we may slow down and take it in that we have done our work, may rest awhile and may appreciate that life is good. The life of this temple is

flourishing. We added thirteen new adult members this year and added six or eight children to our Dharma school. This is about the average increase in membership we have been experiencing the last seven or eight years. It is roughly twice the number of members we lose through death and attrition. This means that our temple is on a path of slow, steady, sustainable growth.

Growing in numbers is, of course, not the most important thing for a religious organization. As Rennyo said, it is not mere numeric growth but the addition of even one more member in the group that have realized a deep faith in the teachings that is most important. My perception is that there is both a deepening spirituality in our temple and a stronger sense of community.

All this is hard for me to take in and here I am encouraging you to appreciate it. The increasingly obvious spirituality, the warmer sense of community and the slow but steady growth in numbers are the harvest we have taken in. It is not just the work that I have done. It is not just the help from Minister's Assistants. It is you, our members that have planted the seeds for this bumper harvest of spirituality, community and slow numeric growth with its promise of economic sustainability. I hope that we can all continue to meet together at the temple and share parts of our journeys through this life together. I hope we can continue to include people of many different ethnicities and cultural backgrounds in our Sangha. The Sangha, or Buddhist community, is one of the three great treasures of the truth as we often affirm in readings at services. It is the one that exists because we walk our paths with reference to the Buddhist teachings. Some might question whether there is a Buddha or there is a Dharma. No one can question whether there is that third jewel of a Buddhist Sangha so long as two or more of us try to live in the light of the teachings. We have a lovely community/Sangha here at the Oregon Buddhist Temple. I am very pleased to be here with all of you.

Summary notes of September 11, 2009 OBT board meeting Ken Garner, OBT Secretary

- A public lecture on the Role of Ritual will be held on October 10 starting at 2:00 pm. The lecture will be conducted by the minister's assistants.
- Due to our recent electricity usage, OBT will be billed at a different rate schedule than we were. The end result is that our rates will most likely increase.
- We are looking for a co-chair for next year's Obonfest.
 Anybody interested in filling this vital role should contact any member of the board.
- The Dharma School has distributed two surveys to parents to solicit their opinions on the proposed parenting class and on the direction and activities of the Dharma School.
- The OBT Membership survey will close September 30. As of the September 11 Board Meeting we have received about 50 responses.
- The property next door to OBT has been sold (sale pending).
- Ann Shintani is the chairperson for the Sukiyaki Bazaar scheduled for October 4. There are opportunities for involvement still available. Contact Ann if you would like to volunteer.
- The election for the 2010 Board will be held in November. If you are interested in serving the OBT community as a board member, contact any of the current board members.
- The next OBT Board meeting will be October 9, 2009, at 7:00 p.m. OBT members are welcome and are encouraged to attend. Minutes of the meetings and reports are available in the temple office in the annex or by contacting the OBT Secretary.

Seeking candidates for the 2010-2012 OBT Board of Directors

The OBT Board is seeking candidates for the 2010-2012 OBT Board of Directors between now and early November when the election will be held by mail-in ballots. The OBT Board of Directors manages and controls the business and property of OBT. There are twelve directors. Each director holds office for a three-year term. Four directors are elected each year. The year 2009 marks the end of the three-year terms for Kim Kono, Jerry Sumoge,

Joe Wahl and Shinya Ichikawa. The remaining Board members are:

2010: Mark Achterman, Hiroshi Matsushima, Al Ono, Elaine Yuzuriha.

2010-2011: Ken Garner, Janie Matsushima, Yoshi Ono, David Wright.

The four directors elected this year will serve from 2010 to 2012. Those leaving the Board this year are eligible for re-election.

All members running for the Board must be members at the time their names are placed on the ballot, must agree to serve on the Board at the time their names are placed on the ballot, and must maintain their membership throughout their term.

The schedule for the election process is as follows:

- Deadline for nominations is October 31, 2009.
- Ballots will be mailed out to members on Monday, November 9.
- Ballots should be returned to OBT by Sunday, November 29 at which time they will be counted and validated.
- Results will be announced at the following Sunday service, and in the December newsletter..

Please consider placing your name on the ballot and being a member of the OBT Board to help carry out the mission statement of the Oregon Buddhist Temple (see box at bottom of page 1). Current Board members will be actively seeking candidates in the next several weeks.

Wheel of Dharma garden Ann Shintani Winner


We have been harvesting heirloom tomatoes and green onions recently for the Dharma School Wheel of Dharma Garden. The following are donors who

Scrip purchases are tax deductible Ken Garner

We were notified by Great Lakes Scrip Program that a recent ruling has established that donations OBT receives as a result of scrip purchases are tax deductible. For example, if you buy a \$100 Safeway card (4% contribution), \$4.00 goes to OBT and you can claim a \$4.00 tax deduction. So you get full value for your scrip card, OBT benefits from your purchase, and you get a tax deduction. The more you buy, the more deductions you can claim. These tax deductions add up quickly and all at no net cost to you. We are tracking purchases by family and at year end will

have your tax deductible amount calculated and available at your request.
