Happy New Year, everyone! At the beginning of this New Year, I would like to extend my best regards to you all.

Last year again, following the year before, Japan, as well as many other countries in the world, was struck with multiple natural disasters. I would like to convey my deepest condolences to those who lost their lives through those

disasters and express my sympathy to everyone affected. In addition, we must never forget that armed conflicts and terror attacks as well as severe starvation is making it difficult to live, and lives are being lost every day.

Last September I had an opportunity to make an official visit to the temples of the Buddhist Churches of America as Monshu for the first time. This allowed me to complete the first round of visitations to all of the overseas districts which include Canada, Hawaii, South America, and the US mainland.

Although every temple and district has its own history and background, many of the overseas Jodo Shinshu temples were established and have been cherished by the Japanese immigrants and their descendants. Reflecting on how sincerely our predecessors entrusted themselves to the Buddha Dharma and how importantly they thought of their temples while facing many difficulties such as World War II, I cannot help but feel grateful and even awe for their tremendous efforts as well as many other wondrous circumstances that have allowed the Jodo Shinshu teaching to be handed down to us today.

However, a considerable amount of time has passed since the Japanese emigrated overseas, and the lifestyle of their descendants, as well as the world situation have changed greatly. In accordance with these changes, quite a few people who are not of ethnically Japanese origin have also come to appreciate the teaching clarified by Shinran Shonin, and attend our overseas temples.

What caused this is nothing but the universality of the Jodo Shinshu teaching that transcends time and space. In other words, Amida Buddha's compassion equally reaches and nondiscriminatively embraces everyone in the midst of all sorts of pain and agony.

In this year, let us continue to listen to the Dharma, considering it is directed to each one of us, and keep moving

forward to share it with many other people as possible.

Beginning of the New Decade

Happy New Year everyone! I hope you are spending a great holiday. This is the third New Year the Sugaharas are welcoming here in Portland and the first New Year welcoming at our new home. I hope we are able to welcome more New Years with the sangha of OBT.

Since Buddhism teaches us that "everything is impermanent," every day is the precious day and we have to treasure them. Not only the day, but also a moment should be something we treasure. According to one of the Buddhist ideas, the shortest unit of time is kṣaṇa, and 65 kṣaṇa will pass while we snap our fingers. So everything is constantly changing, but if you have tried something like a "gradual change test" then we realize how we are really slow to understand gradual changes.

That is why holidays are important to remind us of how we are able to sustain our lives for a whole year. The longer the length of time is, the easier to realize the change. So I would like to ask you a few questions to think about.

1. How was 2019? What is your plan for 2020?
2. This will be the beginning of a new decade. How were your 2010's?
3. What are your objectives for the 2020's?

My answer to question 1: As I wrote in last month's newsletter article, 2019 was the year of challenge. I personally made 2019's theme as "Challenge," and I challenged myself on many things, gained a lot of knowledge regarding Buddhism and martial arts because of the support of many people including professors at school and teachers at martial arts school. By challenging myself about many things I realized how I am supported by many others.

My theme for 2020 is "Development." Using what I have acquired through my challenges, I want to develop programs to grow the Sangha. This is my plan for 2020.

My answer to question 2: For those who were born in 1980, such as myself, it is easy to calculate their age after the year 2000. It can be calculated by separating the four digits into the first two and the latter two and adding them. For example, in

year 2000, I was 20 years old (20+00= 20). In 2020 I will be 40 years old (20+20=40). Feels like this is really a big change to me.

My 2010's was a decade of change. In 2010, Namiko and I got married after dating for 7 years. In 2011, we moved to Sacramento, CA. In 2012, Aoi was born and we became parents. In 2014, I started to study again at Musashino University, graduated in 2016 and entered Musashino Graduate School in the same year. In October 2016, Hikaru was born and we became parents of both a girl and a boy. Aoi became a big sister. That winter, I had a meeting with a few OBT members, and I was assigned as the minister of OBT in 2017. I took the mixed group of Florin and OBT members to Japan in 2018, and I received a master's degree in 2019. This is the recap of my 2010's, but I can say that the "change" occurred due to the support of others. Yuki Sugahara exists here, but this Yuki Sugahara is the accumulation of many events of life, experiences, and learning. Because of others, I am able to realize how I am living the life of constant change.

Finally my answer to question 3: The 2020's will be my 40's. I am hoping to grow the OBT Sangha by providing more educational programs such as study classes and public lecture series. In fact, bi-weekly study classes on the Three Pure Land Sutra begins Wednesday, January 8, 2020, 7 pm at the temple annex. Also OBT is thinking about creating a satellite Sangha around the Corvallis area so I hope that will work out well.

Personally, I would like to pass the Instructor's test for my Kung Fu practice and hopefully the master's test while I am in my 40's. Not sure about a PhD; might start thinking about it when my children grow older. Most importantly, I hope I can continue to serve for OBT and keep challenging myself and continue to develop.

I wish you to have a great year and let us continue to enjoy the Buddha Dharma this year!

Amida Is Foolish Too

The famous Shin myoknin Saichi wrote:
*The world is foolish, I am foolish,
 Amida is foolish too;
 No matter, the parent-like Buddha
 relieves foolishness,
 "Namu-Amida-Butsu"
 Amida is foolish too.*

This is a statement perhaps without parallel in religion. It is a relatively easy thing to say that the world is foolish. Many people have also woken up to their own foolishness. But to realize that the source

of one's salvation, be it God or Buddha or whatever, is *also* foolish – *that* is a revolutionary thing.

What does Saichi mean here? I can't claim to know for sure, But when I reflect it seems to me that Amida is foolish because Amida is never apart from us, who are foolish, and all the world, which is foolish too. Amida participates in our foolishness in order to relieve it. Amida doesn't cast sinners out in anger. Those who are hardest to reach are given the lion's share of Amida's compassionate attention.

I can't pretend to be this compassionate. I prefer to give my love and affection to those who return it. I'm no Buddha. But living in Amida's light, I do wish for others to experience happiness and peace, even those who dislike me or would do me harm. Perhaps we aren't friends now, but there's always the future. So much has changed in my life, including the 180 - degree shift in my thinking about Pure Land Buddhism's worth.

It makes me hold back on saying "never".

Somehow the foolish Amida will help this foolish self to embrace everyone equally.
