Myokonin Asahara Saichi Reverend Yuki Sugahara

Even though I grew up in Kanazawa city, Ishikawa prefecture, my hometown is Oda-city, Shimane because my home temple is there. Oda-city is facing the

ocean and surrounded by mountains so we have a lot of good food there. I have not been able to go back there for probably about 6 years. Shimane prefecture has many strong communities of Jodo Shinshu followers.

The person who deeply enjoyed the teaching is called 炒好人 myo-kou-nin (the wondrous, excellent person). Oda-city had a famous myo-kou-nin named Asahara Saichi. Asahara Saichi was born in 1850. He spent his twenties gambling and drinking alcohol, but he corrected his way of life, and he started to make geta sandals when he was about 40 years old.

His father passed away at the age of 82 years old when Saichi was 45 years old. Because his father passed away reciting nembutsu, Saichi said おやのゆいごん なむあみ

だぶつ "Father's will, Namo Amida Butsu", and he started to listen to the teachings of nembutsu. Around his 60's, he started to write poems regarding the nembutsu teaching. It is said that he left 6,400 poems. This is one of his poems:

この才市には人が恐れております Everyone fear this Saichi

それに人が知らんと思うております

And I think people don't know how evil Saichi is.

I wanted to share this poem because Saichi is known for his portrait with horns on his head. Because Saichi was a famous person in his area, the painter drew a portrait of Saichi. Looking at the portrait, Saichi said "no, it is not me. You've got to draw horns on my head." So Saichi's portrait has horns on his head.



This month is February and Japanese have a tradition of Setsubun, celebration of the change of the season. It is usually around February 3 and a person from the family wears an Oni Ogre's mask, and the rest of the family members throw soybeans at the Ogre saying "Ogre's go away! Fortunes come in!"

The poem and the episode of Saichi makes me think that "I have the ogre-like mind inside of me." Because of this nature of me possessing the ogre-like mind, Amida Buddha established the Primal Vow to grasp and never abandon me. Recognizing the ogre-like mind inside of me is not a negative or pessimistic thing, but it is the reality of myself, and the wisdom of the Buddha guides me to self-reflect on my nature and appreciate Amida's immeasurable working.

The working of Amida Buddha in nembutsu nurtures us to be compassionate towards the other. Instead of saying "Ogre's go away!" we should probably say that "Ogre's come in too! Let's enjoy this moment together!"

The last month has been about the busiest, most exciting time period here at the Oregon Buddhist Temple since winter of 2020. Here's a brief recap:

Mochitsuki:

On December 18th, a small army of volunteers prepared, sold distributed 600 orders of mochi. I'd like to offer special thanks to Coordinators Angie Hughes and Ryan Davis for stepping up to make this possible!

Hoonko Seminar:

On January 14th, we updated our traditional Hoonko Seminar to a hybrid digital/in-person format. Our guest speaker was Reverend Dr. Kenji Akahoshi, who presented an interesting talk about different approaches to communicating the Dharma over the centuries. We had about eight people attend in the Hondo, while about 20 people enjoyed the seminar on Zoom. This is only possible because of the organizing work of the Buddhist Education Committee, led by Brenda Fugate, and the audio-visual tech direction from Chris Dart.

Takumi Taiko:

On January 21st, we enjoyed a Taiko performance of Takumi Kato and his three sons, who are traveling across the United States in a marathon Taiko odyssey. They were electric! I would never have predicted the drama and excitement of seeing children perform like this. Of course, the night wasn't only taiko. Thanks to the organizational creativity of Marilyn Achterman, and the culinary mastery of Robbie Ando and Diane Ando Harder, we enjoyed a very tasty Ramen dinner following the concert. It's no exaggeration to say that the dinner was competitive with any ramen I've had at a restaurant, and, at \$15 per ticket, it was a steal. Thanks to the marketing know-how of Cathy Yarne, we sold out, at about 150 tickets. Many attendees had never even been to the Temple before!

Fence progress:

Nirvana Day (Nehan-E), February 15

NEHAN-E - 三字 娘会-"Nirvana-gathering":

The Sanskrit word Nirvana comes from the root "va" which means "to blow", adding the stem "ana" which means to make, and the prefix "nir" which means "off" or "out". Hence, Nirvana means "the blowing out or extinction". It is understood to mean the blowing out or extinction of the flame of personal desire.

When Shakamuni Buddha attained Enlightenment under the Bodhi Tree, he had achieved Nirvana. However, since he still was in his earthly form, he had not achieved complete Nirvana. When he died at the age of 80, he entered into complete Nirvana.

I've been a member of the Oregon Buddhist Temple for a long time, since about 1968. I know there are longer-term members who grew up in the Temple. I did not. I grew up in Seattle. However my wife

Jayne and I were married in Portland and ours was the first wedding at the then new, current Temple which was dedicated on November 6, 1966. We were married on June 25, 1967.

At the time I was in the Commissioned Corps of the US Public Health Service, not as a doctor but as an engineer. They had hired engineers to help test automobiles to assure that they passed exhaust emission control standards. Any car sold in the United States, including imports from Europe and Japan had to meet the standards. We lived in Ann Arbor, Michigan which is about 15 miles west of Detroit. Jayne taught for a year in Ann Arbor. After serving my two year obligation, we returned to Portland in November 1968.

I've been on and off the OBT Board since 1969. I was Board President one tumultuous year in 2001. So I give our current president Charles Reneau much credit for his calm demeanor and efficiency in getting things done. Last night's (Friday, January 20) Board meeting was a prime example. Thank you, Charles.

Thank you to Reverend Sugahara, our resident minster. I enjoy his Dharma talks and look forward to the bi-weekly Wednesday evening classes. His bass guitar performances are a bonus. But when will Sacramento be assigned a permanent minister so Reverend doesn't have to fly down there every month for a few weeks? Thank you, Sensei.

This past year, our family experienced several deaths. Brother-in-law Herb Osaki died February 10, 2022. My oldest brother Satoru Ichikawa in Seattle died June 29, 2022. Then recently my brother in Lethbridge, Alberta Canada; Akira Ichikawa died on January 3, 2023. All of these relatives influenced my life and I thank them.

Oshōkō 街烧香

honorific-burn-incense

Commonly called incense offering. The burning of incense is a basic ritual act in Mahayana Buddhism, usually in the form of placing burning stick incense vertically in as incense burner.

In Jodoshinshu, this is never done. The stick incense is instead placed horizontally in the burner and ground incense *(Oko)* sprinkled over the embers.

Basically an offering to the Buddha, it also represents the burning away of ones self-created delusions and the simultaneity of birth-death.

In BCA temples, one stops in front of the *Koro* (incense burner) bows once, takes a pinch of *Oko* (ground incense) and sprinkles it over the embers in the burner, recites the Nembutsu, performs the *gassho-raihai*, bows once again and retires. Unlike other sects of Buddhism, one does not raise the *Oko* to the forehead before sprinkling it in the burner.
