Happy New Year to the wonderful members of Oregon Buddhist Temple! We made it to 2026! I am ready to begin this year with a new sense of energy! As many of you know, Rev. Cyndi and I have a baby boy on the way! This will be our first child and we will become parents as well! To say that I am excited and nervous would be an understatement!

While our baby is still a couple of months away from being born, I am beginning to stress about fatherhood and wondering what kind of father I will be. Will I be a good dad?? Many of my close friends know me as kind of a loud, exuberant, loquacious, slightly conceited, person. While I am sure that they love me as I am (hopefully), I need to begin thinking about how I act around my son when he starts getting older.

It is interesting, when I was a child, I almost thought that my parents were basically born, or materialized in this world as fully grown-up, mature adults. It never occurred to me that my parents were once children themselves, and had their own growing up to do. Now I am sure that I will appreciate the ways that they had to be parents and had to act like adults so that my brother and I could act like kids.

The Buddha-Dharma teaches us that all things change. This has to do with our relationships too. We go through so many changes in our relationships to our family and friends. I remember being frustrated as a teenager because I did not have the freedom to do what I want when I want like it seemed my parents were able to do. I remember being in my early 20s and feeling frustrated that I did not have the same amount of money that my parents had or that I had to build my career from the bottom up. It always seemed like my parents had it together.

Since I am about to be a parent now, I can only look back on my past self and realize how foolish my monku (Japanese word for complaining) attitude was. My parents never were truly free to do what they wanted when they wanted because they had to help take care of my brother and me. In fact, they often had to sacrifice much of their free time for the sake of us! Instead of leisurely golfing on weekends, going to the casino, etc., my parents spent many weekends driving my

brother and I to our various extra-curricular activities like acting classes, dance classes, martial arts tournaments, and more! Yes, my parents had more money than me growing up, but so much of that money was spent on me and my brother! Not just essentials like food and clothes, but presents that I am not sure we deserved, and our college education! So much sacrifice so much for us. I am spoiled!

We grew up upper-middle class, so we didn't have the money like Steve Jobs or Bill Gates, but we never went hungry, we never had to worry about losing our house, undergraduate college education was a guarantee for us because my parents sacrificed so much of their personal enjoyments! I am sure that they don't regret this (I hope!), but it is still important for me and my brother to repay this kindness and care. Not only with money, but with genuine gratitude and appreciation.

I write this article because January is also the month of Hōon-Kō, the commemorative service of Shinran Shōnin's (our founder's) passing. The term, Hōon (sounds like Hoh - Own), means "To repay the benevolence". This is the time that Jodo Shinshu members from across Japan and even the world gather at the head temple Nishi Hongwanji to pay their respects to the memory of our founder. We do this because we value our temple and our teachings so much. This community of Oregon Buddhist Temple is here today because of the efforts of Shinran Shōnin.

This time also should remind us to approach our lives by repaying the ones who helped raise us, who nurtured our growth, and enriched our lives with love, presents, and care. We should not go through life thinking that we are owed gifts, money, and power. In truth we should try to think of our lives in a humble way in that we don't "deserve" the advancements that are gifted to us. Don't misunderstand me, I am not saying that we should allow ourselves to be taken advantage of, and that we should let people walk all over us. I am saying that when we receive things, and status in life, we should do so with a deep sense of humility.

With this in mind, I definitely question whether I deserve the privilege of being a father, but I will do my utmost to do the best job I can for my son. This is because my parents did such a wonderful job for me.

**January 2026 President's
Newsletter**

At our monthly Shotsuki-Hoyo Services, the officiant reads Rennyo Shonin's letter *On the White Ashes*, as a reminder of life's impermanence:

"In silently contemplating the fleeting nature of existence, nothing is more fleeting than our journey through this world. It is as an all too short dream." (From a translation by Rev. Taitetsu Unno.)

Since we Temple goers are so often reminded of the impermanence of life, it should not be a surprise to us to see the world changing around us, right? Of course not!

The world is a roiling chaos, buffeted by gusts from every direction, and as individuals we struggle to keep up. Luckily for us, we have a Temple family to help steady us against the unpredictable flow of current events.

I first served as Temple President in 2022 and 2023. When elected, we were only holding Sunday services remotely, due to Covid. Cathy Yarne was still overseeing the refinishing of our basement (after a city water leak), and we were also struggling with increased trespassing, vandalism, and fires at the Temple property.

In the summer of 2022, Resident Minister Rev. Sugahara began working half time at the Sacramento Betsuin, and he had to leave us the next summer. (We have of course enjoyed Supervising Minister Rev. Koyama immensely since July of

2023, but would like to have a full-time minister!) We learned that we'd need to replace the Temple's roof, and of course I'll never forget the multiple times clogged drain pipes led to overflows of wastewater in our basement.

These were stormy times!

Over the course of my two terms, we began having services again, and held our first Obon Festival since 2019. We installed a new roof, and took the difficult step of fencing in the property; more recently, a neighborhood effort to install and maintain planter barrels has prevented uncontrolled RV camping and dumping along our sidewalk. This year's Obon Festival was a record financial success for us, and of course a lot of fun. The drain pipes haven't even clogged in about a year! (Knock on wood.)

During my first terms I felt like we were working hard to rebuild an in-person sangha at our Temple home, just as the Temple property was itself under constant risk of damage and misfortune. Nowadays, I can feel a change for the positive. It looks like more people are coming to Service, and I hope I can focus on helping us increase our Temple's activities and membership. So I feel very lucky to begin a new term as President during a time of relative peace and stability- at least locally.

Outside our neighborhood, events storm on. Another focus I hope to have this year is on supporting our local community of immigrants. I believe this is consistent with the Dharma and with the immigrant history of our sangha. Exactly how we do this is a conversation that will unfold over time. If you have any proposals or ideas, I'm all ears.

Creative Projects & Experimentation

We continue to explore new ways to repurpose donated clothing and fabric. This year, we were especially pleased with the results of marbling tabi, obi fabric, and cloth remnants.

Members created new obi styles by arranging and sewing together remnant fabrics, and silk kimono remnants were combined to make scarves. Experimentation with materials and techniques remains an important and ongoing part of our work.

Working Together

While sewing is often a solitary activity, working as a group provides companionship, idea-sharing, and creative challenges. Our projects require ample space to spread out tables and equipment, and we are very grateful for the use of the **temple basement**, which offers a large, safe, and comfortable environment for our activities.

We sincerely thank everyone who donates **kimono, yukata, obi, and accessories**, which help make our Obon sales possible. **Fabric donations** are also greatly appreciated and are used to create items such as **happi jackets, yukata, head coverings, onenju cases**, and more. All proceeds benefit the temple and the women's group (OBWA). Your continued support makes our work possible.
