Moving Forward in March Rev. Jundo Gregory Gibbs

We have a busy month ahead of us, and I am still thinking of the past. Specifically, I am thinking of Dr. Jeff Wilson's succinct presentation of Jodo Shinshu as "relax, trust, live with gratitude." However, the first time I typed it

here, it came out "relax, rust, live with gratitude." Older men make many typographical mistakes. It was 35 years ago that Neil Young revived the then 25-year-old advertising jingle as a title for his tour and album: "Rust Never Sleeps." Isn't that the truth, 'though? Perhaps if we can follow Jeff's advice and learn to relax, trust and live with gratitude, we won't rust up so badly.

Please allow me to draw your attention to Bishop Kodo Umezu's visit to our temple March 14, 15 and 16. On Sunday, March 16, he will deliver the Dharma-message at our morning service. On Saturday, 3-15, he will be here to hear how you feel things are going with the Oregon Buddhist Temple. Let the Bishop know how you feel about the temple, its current direction and its leadership. My family and I have enjoyed watching OBT progress toward being a multi-ethnic, multi-generational temple, still deeply rooted in Japanese culture and in the Japanese-American community. We have built closer ties to the Japanese Ancestral Society and other Japanese-American organizations in Oregon over these past twelve years. We have also established strong ties with the broader Buddhist Community in the greater Portland area. The Oregon Buddhist Temple has continued to nurture its core, long-affiliated community while drawing new members of all ethnicities and backgrounds. Not only my family and I, and the Minister's Assistants, but many of our long-time members can be seen going out of their way to make positive contacts with anyone who walks in our door. Rust never sleeps, but we are not rusting up. We are moving forward to a bright future in a relaxed, trusting and thankful way.

Our school of Pure Land, Mahayana, Buddhism, Jodo Shinshu, is potentially for everyone. We have to keep welcoming everyone

we meet to join us, but we don't know who will or who will not be deeply touched by the nembutsu teaching. Even Sakyamuni Buddha failed to reach some. As he descended the mountain, shortly after Enlightenment, the sutras tell us that he met one man who asked him, "You look like something special happened to you. What's going on with you?" Sakyamuni explained that he had awakened to Buddhahood and the man replied (translating roughly) "Oh, ... I thought it must be something like that." He walked off without receiving the Dharma. He had no interest in what Sakyamuni Buddha was trying to share.

Lets not rust up. Let's continue to welcome everyone into our community, into our Sangha. Some will stay, some will be deeply nurtured, others may not be able to develop a taste for this particular school of Buddhism. So long as the Oregon Buddhist Temple continues to make the nembutsu teaching available to anyone who might have an interest in it, it/we will flourish. We all have the best interests of the temple in mind. Let's shake off the rust and move forward in the month of March and beyond. If you aren't sure how to relax, come to the "Tai Chi as Exercise" classes on most Mondays and Fridays. If you aren't sure how to trust, come to the services on Sundays and the Buddhist study classes on Mondays and Fridays. So far as living in gratitude goes, let's continue to learn how to do this together.

Food Handling Reminnder

The Salmon Dinner is fast approaching. Please take a moment to remind yourself about your safe food handling practices. To help everyone get into the habit, we'll be frequently asking/reminding everyone to do the following: Clean all work surfaces with bleach solution. Sanitize work surfaces frequently. At home I realized how many things I put on the kitchen counter like grocery bags, purses, newspaper, etc.

Re-wash your hands. Get in the habit of washing your hands frequently. We don't usually think about all the things we've touch while standing in the kitchen – like cabinets, food containers, table tops, clothes, hair, etc.)

Check your hair. Hairnets are not only used to cover your hair but also keep it from falling onto work surfaces and food.

Check your sleeves. To ensure your sleeves do not touch food, roll your sleeves up above your wrists or wear a top with a shorter sleeve length.

Lady Kujo, Lady Ohtani Service

Etsu Osaki

The Sunday service on February 2, was dedicated to the memory of Lady Takeko Kujo and Lady Yoshiko Ohtani, and was conducted by OBWA. Lady Kujo (1887-1928), daughter of the 21st Gomonshu, Koson Ohtani, was the founder of the Buddhist Women's Association and of Asoka Hospital. She authored the book "Muyuge: Flower Without Sorrow," a Japanese classic.

Lady Ohtani (1918-2000) was the wife of the 23rd Gomonshu, Kosho Ohtani. She visited many temples in Japan and around the world to help revive the Buddhist Women's movement after World War II.

"A Moment in Eternity" by Lady Kujo

Shadows from the seven hills of Rome creep up to the ruins of an ancient civilization. The ruins seem to symbolize the end of history on earth.

When compared with eternal nature, the briefness of man's history and his impermanence becomes clear.

Our existence is no more than a grain of millet.

Regardless of how momentary, however, there is no doubt that we exist. We must not let even a fraction of this time escape us—the sacredness of life thus becomes apparent.


