## ***Giving all year round*** ***Rev. Jundo Gregory Gibbs***

I am hoping that this newsletter will reach you in time to remind you of our night-long Bodhi Day Nembutsu-centered retreat here at the OBT temple 12-5 from 8:15 p.m. This will be our second annual Bodhi Day Nembutsu retreat. The one last year was a big hit with those who were able to attend. The event will run for 12 hours but you can attend for as little as five or ten minutes if you'd like to pop in and join us in vocal nembutsu for awhile.

Organizing and presenting this educational and spiritual event is a way the Ministers Assistants and I hope to give something special to the temple community. If you are able to attend and participate, even briefly, that will be a way of giving your support to us and to the temple. It is also a way of repaying your indebtedness to Amida Buddha for fulfilling the Vow of Universal Liberation (Hon Gan). We like to offer the retreat leading up to our Bodhi Day service the next morning. Most of the world's major religions have a special observation in December and for Buddhists it is Bodhi Day, the commemoration of the Awakening to Enlightenment of the historical Buddha Sakyamuni.

Giving is the active expression of wisdom. Giving is crucial to our humanity. As oseibo/year-end giving approaches some of us may find ourselves a bit short of funds. We can't, all of us, give money to persons who have helped us, causes that we believe in, institutions that nurture us. However, many of us can give time and effort. If we are too busy to volunteer at OBT or other organizations we believe in, or if we are not well enough to exert physical effort we can still, all of us, give kind words and positive intentions. Giving is the way Buddhist live. If we are too ill to say kind and encouraging words we can give appreciative glances.

We are including envelopes in this newsletter that some of you may wish to use to make year end gifts to the temple

or to me. You should only make such a donation if you can afford to and if you feel that you have been benefited by the temple and me. For those of you who are able and inclined to make this donation I hope you will understand that any amount will be sincerely appreciated.

Rev. Art Takemoto used to tell a story about doing a memorial service for a pre-teenage boy who had lost his mother. The boy gave him one dollar as a donation for the service. I first heard Rev. Art tell that story when I was a lay member of the Fresno temple. That would have been about 26 years ago. At the time I thought, "Why didn't he just tell the boy that no donation was necessary?" I heard Rev. Takemoto tell the same story again when I had been a minister for about five years. That would have been about 1999. By then I understood. Ministers have to let people give. Helping people learn to give, even in their youth, is part of our job. I'm sure Rev. Art didn't crave that one dollar bill. He wanted the boy to have the feeling of dignity that comes with arranging a memorial for one's mother. He wanted the boy to know that giving is how we live, the most crucial aspect of being Buddhist, of being human. To have refused to receive the donation would have taken something away from the boy, something of much greater worth than one dollar.

Please make giving a central part of your life as a Buddhist. But, remember giving is a kindness. The fundamental thing given is kindness. If we can afford to make a monetary donation to those we feel help us that is great. But none of us is so poor we cannot give a kind word, a smile, a gentle glance. I want to thank all the members and friends of the Oregon Buddhist Temple for all you have given to my family and me these past eight years. We appreciate your support. We appreciate your kindness. We appreciate you.

- We are looking for a chair person for the Spring Food Bazaar (March 7, 2010). Anybody interested in filling this vital role should contact any member of the board.
- Greeters for upcoming Sunday Services will be: 11/15 Ernie Takeda, 11/22 Shinya Ichikawa, 11/29 Elaine Yuzuriha, 12/6 Yoshi Ono. Anybody interested in taking a turn at greeting our members and visitors should contact any member of the board.
- The recent number of funerals held at the temple has taxed the members of the funeral committee and other temple member helpers. The board will review and update our procedures for these occasions.
- The board is reviewing OBT's insurance coverage. We will be updating our coverage to include personal liability for the Board Members and Dharma School Staff. This will include the adoption of a temple Sexual Harassment and Conduct Policy as well as background check on all people filling these roles.

For example, if you buy a \$25 Lands End card (currently 17% contribution), \$4.25 goes to OB T and you can claim a \$4.25 tax deduction. So you get full value for your scrip card, OB T benefits from your purchase, and

you get a tax deduction. The more you buy, the more deductions you can claim. These tax deductions add up quickly and all at NO NET COST TO YOU. We are tracking purchases by family and at year end will have your tax deductible amount calculated and available at your request.




## ***Shinran Shonin 750th Memorial*** Cynthia Wong

The Buddhist Churches of America will commemorate the 750th memorial anniversary of our denominational founder, Shinran Shonin, with a symposium, banquet, service, and musical program to be held on February 27-28, 2010, at the Fairmont Hotel in San Jose, CA. The theme of the programs is "Peace and Tranquility." The programs will directly follow the National Council meeting, which will be held at the same location from Thursday, February 26, until the morning of Saturday, February 28. The symposium will feature a keynote address by Pieper Toyama, head of the Pacific Buddhist Academy in Honolulu, HI. There will also be a Japanese-language presentation by Rev. Dr. Kenneth

Tanaka, and English-language presentations by Dr. James Dobbins, Rev. Harry Bridge, and Jacqueline Kramer.

Schedule information is provided below, and I can supply you with any other information that you may need concerning the programs, hotel accommodations, and airport transportation.
