Obon and Hatsubon Rev. Jundo Gregory Gibbs

I hope you will join us on July 26th for our Obon and Hatsubon service. This service is an important Buddhist time to reflect on those we love who have

preceded us in passing to the next life It is also Hatsubon, first Obon service since passing, for some members of our temple whom we have lost in the last year. We will have a guest speaker for our service, Rev. Jerry Hirano of the Salt Lake City Buddhist Temple. Rev. Hirano was first introduced to Jodo Shinshu Buddhism at the Salt Lake Temple and was able to return to be their resident minister. He is taking time out of his busy schedule to be our guest on 7-26. I know that most of you are very busy too but I hope you will find time to be with us that day and hear Hirano Sensei's Dharma message. Our Obon service day will begin at 9:30 a.m on 7-26 with a short service that will include a Dharma-message in the Japanese language. Our main service will begin at 10a.m.

The 10 a.m. Service on July 26th will both be the Obon service and the Hatsubon remembrance for those who have passed on since our last Obon/Hatsubon service at the end of July in 2008. We will call the names of those temple members and friends of our temple who passed away this last year. If possible a family representative will come forward to offer incense in their honor. In the case that no family member is able to attend the service we will have one of the Ministers Assistants offer incense on their behalf.

The day before our Obon and Hatsubon service I will make visitations to cemeteries and have a service to honor those whose cremated remains have been placed in our No Kotsu Do [place of reverence for ashes of those we honor]. That Saturday, July 25th I will officiate for a brief service at the Rose City Cemetery at 9 a.m. Next I will go to the Gresham cemetery and hold a service for our members who have loved ones remains kept there. At the Gresham cemetery we meet at 10:30 a.m. I will be back to the temple

for a service at noon. I hope that some of you can join us for these services.

As with the majority of the hundred or so Jodo Shinshu Buddhist temples in North America we hold our Obon service one week and our Obon festival the next week. Having already honored our loved ones in a sincere and somewhat solemn way at the service on Sunday July 26, the next Saturday will be the charming Obonfest where we celebrate our conviction of a positive new life for our loved ones, reacquaint ourselves with Japanese culture and Buddhist traditions and generally have a good time.

Our Obonfest is always the first Saturday of August. This year that is also the first day of August. On Saturday August 1 we would love to have you join us for our Obonfest. Still in the planning stages as I write but we expect to begin about 4 p.m. and finish about nine. The Obon dance segment of the festival is scheduled to start at ten minutes before 7 p.m. The folk dances used to express positive conviction about the future are quite easy and we invite everyone to join us. If you want a preview and a little practice that will be available each Tuesday and Thursday preceding the festival starting on Tuesday July 14th. Lady Sahomi Tachibana will again be the chief instructor for those Obon dance practice sessions. For security reasons we ask that you enter from the temple's back door and come downstairs for the Obon dance practices on Tuesdays and Thursdays beginning in mid-July. We will look forward to having you join us with forms of Buddha recollection rattling around in the back of your mind, forming a ground base in the depths of your heart.
