Starting Over in 2010 Rev. Jundo Gregory Gibbs

Happy New Year! I hope this New Year brings all of you continued or improving good health and much happiness. The

beginning of the New Year is always a chance to start over. I hope that we can all have a refreshed new take on life in 2010.

Being a baby boomer the concept of starting over reminds me of two singer songwriters who much influenced me in my youth. Bob Dylan had a song called "New Morning" about 40 years ago. John Lennon sang a song called "Just like Starting Over" a little more than 30 years ago. There was, perhaps, a willful insistence on a new beginning in those two songs. Starting over comes with carrying all the old karma with us. John Lennon knew that and was just trying to be optimistic. I've never been too sure what Bob Dylan knows or means to say but I think there was a hope for renewal in his song "New Morning" whether or not he understood that the new morning comes along with the old karma.

Buddhist spirituality tries to encourage such hopefulness – it's a new year, lets' start all over again! Buddhist religiosity also wants us to know that we do carry the past karma forward with us and are influenced by it even as we try to forge renewed, fulfilling and valuable lives. If I am going to start over it still has to be me who starts over, the guy who has been making choices and generating karmic influences for sixty years.

Karma is the part of the web of causes and effects we can do something about. The Euro-American tradition of making New Years' resolutions is a charming procedure that Jodo Shinshu Buddhists can engage in if we want to. About five years ago I told you all that I made a resolution "not to gain more than ten pounds in the coming year". I actually lost five pounds that year by having a very do-able resolution that I didn't have to worry about falling away from. Of course, that was five years ago. Those five

pounds have come back, - bringing brothers and sisters with them. So I will make a resolution for 2010: I will increase the amount of exercise I regularly do. I am not promising to eat less or to lose weight. I'll tell you next January if just increasing my exercise regimen by about thirty percent leads to weight loss, improved energy or both.

Let me reprise a bit in commenting on John Lennon. He died on Bodhi Day in 1980. He was murdered by a fundamentalist who hated John for his critical remarks about religious belief. John Lennon pretty much gave the same advice as Sakyamuni Buddha: "Don't believe things just because they are written in some religions' book or because everyone tells you that you must believe it. Only believe in ideas that seem true to you after applying them to the important business of living your life". I doubt very much I would be here, a Buddhist minister in the Pure Land stream of Mahayana Buddhism, if it weren't for John Lennon's recordings back in the 1960's and 1970's. I was one of millions of people who first encountered notions like karma through his songs. John Lennon planted seeds of Awakening in my mind that were added to and nurtured by teachings from Shinran, Shunryu Suzuki, Wajo Sensei Rev. Kakue Miyaji, Dennis Hirota, Robert Aitken and others. For me, John Lennon's songs were part of a process of starting over, a process that continues today.

I hope that this still fresh year of 2010 will be a starting over for all of us. The Oregon Buddhist Temple will provide various resources for renewal in the month of January. One important resource will be our Ho On Ko seminar and service. Our guest minister, Rev. Kiyonobu Kuwahara, will lead our seminar on "Jodo Shinshu Buddhism in Daily Life" Saturday 1/16 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. There is no charge for attending this seminar and we would love to have you join us. If you can't make the seminar please come the next day, 1/17, for our Ho On Ko service. At 9:30 a.m. Sunday, 1/17, Rev. Kuwahara will deliver a Japanese-language Dharma message. At the main service beginning at 10 a.m. he will speak in English. Please join us for our Ho On Ko seminar and service.

Thank you again for your efforts on behalf of our temple.




Lotus circle – January Jean Matsumoto

NW District Convention in Ontario, Feb. 12-14, 2010 Cynthia Wong, Coordinator

The annual Northwest District Convention will be held in Ontario, Oregon, from

Friday, February 12 through noon on Sunday, February 14, 2010. Hosted by the Idaho-Oregon Buddhist Temple, the theme of the conference will be "Yononaka Annon Nare" or "May Peace and Tranquility Prevail Throughout the World," in line with the theme of the Shinran Shonin 750th Memorial. Rev. Dr. Nobuo Haneda will be the guest speaker. The Friday evening registration, meetings, and activities will be held at the Idaho-Oregon Temple, while programs on the other days will take place at the Four Rivers Cultural Center. The Cultural Center also has a museum with some items relating to Japanese-American history.

Information about hotel accommodations and registration forms are available on the table in the OBT lobby, as well as from the IOBT website, http://www.iobt.org. The cost of registration for the

convention is \$97 for adults, \$75 for youth in grade 6 through college, \$60 for children in kindergarten through grade 5, and \$45 for preschool children. The fee includes a bento box to take away on Sunday afternoon. If you do not wish to purchase the bento box, you may deduct \$10 from the cost of your registration. Also, if you wish to attend the Saturday night banquet only, the cost is \$50. There will be subsidies available for members of OBWA and for Dharma School students. Please contact Alice Ando, OBWA President, or Amy Peterson, Dharma School Coordinator, to confirm the amount of your subsidy. There is a dodge ball tournament tentatively scheduled for Friday night at 7:30 pm, with two divisions: age 10-15 and age 16-up (including adults). There is no charge to participate, but there is a registration/release form to submit if you are interested in playing. We need to have six participants to make a team in either division.

IOBT held a prize drawing from the names of members who attended the 2009 Northwest District Convention in Portland. The following members from OBT are winners: Chris Leedham won free registration to the 2010 District Convention; Al Abe, Frieda Fujikawa, and Mika Semke all won free Sunday bento boxes. All you prize winners, be sure to subtract the value of your prize from the checks that you write for convention registration. Also, if you do not intend to attend the 2010 NW District Convention but would like to transfer your prize to someone else, you can do that. Just let Cynthia Wong know whom you would like to transfer your prize to, and she will inform the Ontario coordinators of the transfer.

There will be a chartered bus from Raz Transportation/Gray Line Portland to take us from OBT to the convention. The bus will leave OBT at 7:15 am on Friday, February 12 and arrive at the Idaho-Oregon Temple in time for the ministers' meeting at 5 pm. The OBT Board of Directors has generously agreed to subsidize the cost of the bus. The roundtrip fare will be \$40 for adults and \$20 for children (age 16 and under). This is a steal when you consider the length of the trip (7-8 hours driving time) and the fact that Greyhound charges \$90 or more for the same trip. The bus will also take us to our hotels on Friday night after the programs are finished, and bring us from our hotels to the Four Rivers Cultural Center on Saturday and Sunday. The hotels which are offering a special discounted convention rate are the Holiday Inn Express and Suites and the Holiday Inn. Please stay at one of these if you plan to ride the bus, since the bus will not stop at other accommodations.

Please submit your registration forms with payment for registration and bus fare, if needed, to Cynthia Wong. The deadline for registration and payment is January 10, 2010. Please make checks payable to the Oregon Buddhist Temple. Cynthia is available to answer all of your questions after service, or call her on her cell phone at 503-608-2981. Let's take this opportunity to visit with dharma friends old and new, and hear the Buddha's teaching from our Northwest District ministers.
