Drinking the healing waters Reverend Jundo Gregory Gibbs

This Summer I hope we will all remember to keep hydrated, to drink

plenty of water. Water keeps us alive. Every summer we lose friends who simply did not drink enough of it on hot days. I hope you will also take a moment, from time to time, to say the nembutsu in forms like "Namo Amida Butsu". These words can flow like healing waters into our hearts, minds and bodies. Not only the nembutsu but any "kind and beautiful words" act like healing waters as they flow out between our lips and in through our ears.

Besides putting clean water into ourselves in the summer we want to remember not to imbibe the three poisons of greed, anger and delusion. There is one venomous action that combines all three of the poisons Buddhists strive to avoid in one noxious cocktail: gossip. Gossips are greedy for the spotlight and compelled to demand our attentions. Gossips are filled with hate and work to harm those they circulate stories about. Gossips are deluded, destroying their own reputations while trying to insult others. Gossip is the whole bag of ugliness Buddhism tries to draw us away from.

Tricycle magazine's summer 2010 issue has a long article on how gossip destroys Buddhist communities. As Roshi Joan Halifax says in that article: "one of the heaviest karmas is to divide or demoralize the sangha, and gossiping, third-party communication certainly does this. In a time when gossip makes headlines and speech is used to divide and not unite, we must be especially vigilant". There is only one way to stop gossip and that is to not gossip, to not listen to or repeat hearsay, "third party communication". So please avoid the malignant waters of gossip, and avoid the company of those who release such venom through their lips. Let's each try to make this the summer of no gossip.

Specific events in June I would like to draw your

attention include the Buddhist Festival in the Park: Unity and Diversity. This yearly, interdenominational Buddhist festival is held in the Col. Summers Park, at S.E. 17th and Taylor streets, June 5th from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. I will be one of the panelists on the topic of Buddhist unity and diversity. I will be joined with priests trained in the Tibetan, Zen and Vipassana traditions so we will have a diverse group of Buddhists to address the topic of diversity in our tradition. Many traditions will have informational tables as will OBT. Come out and learn more about our fellow Buddhists here in the greater Portland area.

On June 19th Lady Sahomi Tachibana will hold a performance by her Japanese dance company in the temple basement. The performance will probably start at 7 p.m. but you might like to come a little early to chat with the special friends who come to this event each year. We cannot be sure how many more years Sahomi Sensei will be performing along with her troupe so please come out this year for an evening of Japanese dance on June 19th.

Also, we will have a drama camp for children starting June 15th. Temple members Ryan Davis and Angie Hughes are organizing this wonderful opportunity for children to develop their abilities to express themselves. See Angie's article for details.

President's message – What OBT offers our community Kim Kono, OBT President

For 107 years the Oregon Buddhist

Temple has provided generations of members and families a place to gather, celebrate Japanese American culture, and practice the Buddha Dharma. Increasingly, thanks to Reverend Gibbs, the work of our Buddhist Education Committee and our active Sangha, OBT is not only serving its own members, but also is reaching out to the broader community. We're partnering with other organizations while responding to the public's interest in learning more about Buddhism. This is especially evident with the slate of events occurring this spring and summer.

On May 15, OBT offered two events open and free to the public. In the morning, the OBWA hosted a talk on stroke awareness by OBT member and neurologist, Dr. Lisa Yanase. In the afternoon, Reverend Gibbs, OBT member Jerry Fugate, and Reverend Gyokuko Carlson of the Dharma Rain Zen Center, led a panel discussion on "Shakespeare: A Buddhist Perspective" (see write-up in the Oregonian Living Section on May 10). Both talks featured such different topics, yet brought members and citizens together to learn from one another at the temple.

On June 5th OBT will participate in the Buddhist Day in the Park at Colonel Summers Park in SE Portland. This gathering brings together multiple organizations from various denominations, including OBT, providing a friendly forum that recognizes Buddhism's growing following and engaging citizens through dialogue and displays. Thanks to outreach efforts by Reverend Gibbs and our ministers' assistants, OBT shares the Dharma not just within our temple walls, but also at community affairs like this, which attract hundreds of attendees.

And of course, there's ObonFest, coming your way on Saturday, August 7th. Under the leadership of chair and board member, Joe Wahl, Obon is the biggest fundraiser and event, celebrating our ethnic roots and reminding us of ancestors past. Depending on who you are, Obon can represent many things: it may evoke childhood memories of dancing and games; of hard work, lots of cooking and great food; or simply a great day hanging out with friends and family. For OBT members, it's definitely a time to showcase our lovely temple, introduce it to the public at large and extend an open invitation to come visit again. I hope you'll join in the planning by volunteering and helping out, and then, partake of the fun by attending this joyful event.

Update on last year's OBT membership survey Yoshi Ono and Kim Kono

In the fall of last year the board conducted a survey of the past and

present OBT members to try and gather feedback to assess general impressions of the overall health of the Temple, areas which were working well and those areas in need of improvement. Thank you to those that did respond. With about a 26% return rate, we had both survey responses and many comments. We followed this up in February with a meeting where all past board presidents were invited to review the results and discuss potential action items. We had a total of 11 presidents attend on the Super Bowl Sunday which speaks very highly of their dedication to the temple. They were Al Abe, Mark Achterman, Shinya Ichikawa, Michael Ishii, Kim Kono, Jean Matsumoto, Al Ono, Yoshi Ono, Stan Shiigi, Joe Wahl, and Kan Yagi. This article is intended to summarize some of the key points from that meeting.

• It would be desirable to obtain more detailed information in a future follow up survey to understand demographics and trends

• Grooming volunteer chairs and leaders of our key events and regular temple functions is critical. Maintaining continuity over several years will facilitate organizing the events.

• We should be more direct in asking for contributions, putting out envelopes and passing the basket, etc.

• We discussed the need for creating a stronger support system and activities for our senior members (in addition to what OBWA currently provides); however, a volunteer has to champion this effort.

• Growth of our Sangha through outreach activities and member retention.

• As we grow more diverse in ethnicity, how do we choose to sustain and celebrate OBT's Japanese ethnic roots while building our membership?

We decided that holding such past presidents meetings was a great idea and scheduling about two per year was a good frequency. Things we will cover in the next meeting are:

a) Identify and implement strategies to recruit, train and sustain volunteer leadership of key OBT events, activities, and needs.

b) Interview lapsed members and new members to determine what attracts them to OBT and what activities/services/values would retain their long-term membership.

c) Examine and focus on new fundraising strategies and resources, e.g. bequests and planned gifts to OBT, building on scrip or other creative practices.

d) Research best practices with other temples and BCA in conducting a performance evaluation of OBT Reverend.

We have started to make some changes to address the items brought up, such as placement of the donation box and ordering a bronze plaque labeled "donations" in the foyer, and holding a dharma exchange to review the committees and recruit new volunteers. We will also schedule a Dharma Exchange session to disclose the survey results, discuss some of the recommendations of the past presidents, and to get more discussion among those attending. Please keep an eye out for the announcement and attend if you able.




Scrip Tip Ken Garner

Jodo Shinshu Correspondence Course 2010 Fall Enrollment Applications Now Accepted

The Jodo Shinshu Correspondence Course Office is now accepting applications for their fall 2010 enrollment. The popular 2-year, computer-based program continues to offer online instruction in the origins and development of Buddhism, Shinran Shonin's life and teaching, sutras & masters of the Pure Land tradition and history of Jodo Shinshu.

An excellent opportunity for beginners or for those who have already studied Jodo Shinshu, the program reaches out to people all over the world. Students come from Brazil, Canada, Germany, Malaysia, Belgium, Poland, Japan, as well as, Hawaii and the BCA. With over 100 students enrolled, the course has much to offer those interested in deepening their understanding of Buddhism and Jodo Shinshu. The course instructors consist of 14 ministers and professors who specialize in the subjects taught. An optional August Workshop at the Jodo Shinshu Center is held every year.
